On Sunday, Feb. 25, Judy and I attended Covenant UMC in Port Orange for worship service. B. J. Foster is the pastor and she began the sermon with these words – “Jesus wept!”

The Parkland tragedy with 17 victims of gun violence, prompts us to ask - where do we begin. B. J. reminds us we begin with mourning and sadness. The text where it says Jesus wept happens when he is entering Jerusalem with the crowds hailing Him as the King. Then Luke says this:

“If you, even you, had only known on this day what would bring you peace – but now it is hidden from your eyes. The days will come upon you when your enemies will build an embankment against you and encircle you and hem you in on every side. They will dash you to the ground, you and the children within your walls. They will not leave one stone on another, because you did not recognize the time God’s coming to you.” (Luke: 19:41-44)

Jesus weeps that God’s world, God’s city has turned from peace to violence (the cross). I think Jesus wept on Ash Wednesday when that school was attacked. We should weep as a church that needed to reach the shooter.

“God forgive us when we fail to see those who need your love and grace. Father, help us to reach out and fulfill your mission to transform this world.”

In Matthew’s Gospel Jesus laments for Jerusalem.

Oh Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets and stone those sent to you, how often I have longed to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings, but you were not willing. Look, your house is left to you desolate. For I tell you, you will not see me again until you say, ‘Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.’ (Matthew 23:37-39)

We need to weep, pray and long for a world that is loving not violent. In Luke’s Gospel Jesus then turns to action – He cleans the Temple. Jesus weeps and laments and then acts. I hope we all can take action. One way is to be a part of the Conference 5000 Letter Action Plan. www.5000letters.com

Let me close with a Psalm I turn to in time of grief and sorrow:

I lift up my eyes to the hills – where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth.

He will not let your foot slip – he who watches over you will not slumber; indeed, he who watches over Israel will neither slumber nor sleep.

The Lord watches over you- the Lord is your shade at your right hand; the sun will not harm you by day nor the moon by night.

The Lord will keep you from all harm – he will watch over your life; the Lord will watch over your coming and going both now and forevermore. (Ps. 121)
